Mo Farah breaks British record with 3rd place London Marathon finish

Mo Farah became the fastest marathon runner in British history as he produced a promising and gutsy performance to finish third in his second London Marathon.

A "knackered" Farah crossed the line in a time of 2:06:21, comfortably clear of Steve Jones' 33-year-old British record, despite two mix-ups with water bottles in which he said marathon staff were taking pictures rather than helping him find his drink.

The race was won by Eliud Kipchoge, the Olympic champion and the man considered by many to be the greatest marathon runner ever, in a time of 2:04:17.
