Could turning plastic bottles into roads be the future?

A Scottish company thinks it might have the answer to the single use plastic problem. They have turned 20 tonnes of recycled plastic into tiny pellets and laid them as the surface of a road - that's the equivalent of 1.25 million plastic water bottles!
