'Nearly two-thirds' of workers commuting again, says ONS

Nearly two in three workers are now commuting again, as some employers ask their staff to return to offices during the pandemic.

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) said that 62% of adult workers reported travelling to work last week.

Royal Mint won't produce any more 2p or £2 coins for 10 years as cash use declines

The Royal Mint claims there are enough of the coins to last for the next decade and with cash use declining, it has no plans to make any more.

Ten years ago, cash was used for six in every 10 transactions, but by 2019, that statistic was smaller than three in 10.

Coronavirus may have accelerated that decline further, with National Audit Office figures revealing the demand for notes and coins fell by 71% from early March to mid-April.

Currently there are 417 million £2 coins in general circulation in the UK.

There are also 6.55 billion 2p coins.
