Doctor explains how to calculate your perfect bedtime to wake up feeling refreshed

A doctor posted a video this week to explain that feeling groggy when you wake up may come down to interrupting your natural sleep patterns rather than simply not getting enough rest.



He explains that every night your brain moves through several sleep cycles. Each cycle starts with light sleep, then you enter deep sleep, then dream, and back to light.

Each of these sleep cycles is around 90 minutes.

To plan for an excellent nights sleep, you should work backwards in 90 minute periods until you reach the time closest to when you want to go to bed.
