

Queen becomes world's second longest reigning modern monarch

The Queen has become the world's second longest reigning modern monarch.

She has overtaken Thailand's King Bhumibol Adulyadej, who reigned for

25 694 days between 1946 and 2016.

Queen Elizabeth II became gueen on the 6th of February 1952 and has ruled the realm for 7 days more than this.

EU agrees directive that will force Apple to change iPhone charging port

The European Union has reached a provisional agreement that will effectively force Apple to change the charging port used by its smaller electronics.



According to the EU, the move will reduce electronics waste because consumers will no longer need a different charging cable every time they purchase a new device.

Old chargers generate an estimated 51 000 tonnes of electronic waste per year and the EU believes a "one size fits all" approach would make customers' lives easier and help the environment.
