Half a million trees have died next to one 21 mile stretch of road, National Highways admits

Following an upgrade of the A14 road in 2020, a number of mature trees were destroyed during the construction.

Planting new ones was part of the development consent order, the permission to build.

National Highways planted 850 000 saplings but half a million of them have since died. National Highways point to poor soil and extreme heat as the main causes.

Man decides to live underwater for 100 days to see what it does to his body

Give peanut butter to babies to cut allergy rates by 77%, scientists say

Giving babies smooth peanut butter between the age of 4 and 6 months

could cause peanut allergies to plummet, scientists say.

Researchers found there was a clear "window of

opportunity" to expose babies to peanuts and reduce the risk of them developing an allergy.

Introducing peanut products into all babies' diets by 6 months could reduce peanut allergy across the population by up to 77%, the study found.
